Introduction



The Indiana Broadband Office (IBO) is required to create a "Challenge Process" through which a unit of local government, nonprofit organization, or broadband service provider may submit a challenge as to whether a particular broadband serviceable location is unserved or underserved. A location must be unserved or underserved in order to be eligible for BEAD funds.

This community engagement toolkit aims to help guide communities through the BEAD Challenge Process. It contains information on what steps local governments and community anchor institutions (CAIs) wishing to participate in the challenge should take in order to prepare properly.

This toolkit begins with a brief explanation of BEAD and its different phases, directions for governments and CAIs to register for a CostQuest license and with Ready.net to be able to submit challenges on behalf of their communities. It also has ready-to-use community engagement materials such as flyers, trackers and other templates challenging organizations may find helpful aides for educating members of the public about this process and gathering the needed evidence for challenge submissions.

Organizations utilizing this toolkit are free to use, disseminate the included materials, customize templates for their own use, including replacing SIRPC logos with their own organizational iconography. 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BEAD Challenge Process



Starting in 2021, the Infrastructure, Investment and Jobs Act funded a series of investments with the goal of providing broadband access to the entire country. **Broadband Equity Access and Deployment** is a multi-phase program with requirements at each phase which US states and territories must follow for broadband money. The IBO has already completed the previous steps of creating a State Broadband Plan and getting public feedback on that plan. Now we're in the challenge phase which will last from March 4- April 17 of 2024.

The Indiana Broadband Office (IBO) is required to create a "Challenge Process" through which a unit of local government, nonprofit organization, or broadband service provider may submit a challenge as to whether a particular broadband serviceable location is unserved or underserved. A location must be unserved or underserved in order to be eligible for BEAD funds.

Here's what you need to know.....

Only locations where the information about available service is *incorrect* will be submitted during the challenge process. Typically, this will mean that a location may be marked as "served" when speed test results and other evidence shows that it is actually unserved or underserved. The challenge process is *not* focused on locations marked correctly, even if they are unserved.

"Unserved" refers to any location without access to internet which provides the federally required minimum speed of at least 25mbps download and 3mbps upload. This definition also applies to any areas where the only type of internet service available is satellite. "Underserved" refers to any location without access to internet speeds of at least 100mbps download and 20 mbps upload.

Individuals themselves will not directly submit a challenge to the IBO. Instead, individuals should reach out to their unit of local government, nonprofit organization, or broadband service provider to initiate a challenge request on their behalf.

Individuals wanting to have a challenge submitted on their behalf will need to take internet speed tests via <u>ConnectingIndiana.com</u> in order to provide evidence needed for a challenge. While there are other options for speed test platforms, this is the one the IBO specifically created to capture information necessary for meeting mandated BEAD requirements.



Challenge Process Cont'd

There are a number of actions communities will need to take if they want to participate in the challenge process.

Local Governments and Community Anchor Institutions

Promote ConnectingIndiana.com to your communities

Encouraging your constituents to do speed test and showing them how to do so correctly helps provide you with evidence you'll need for challenge submissions.

Register for Ready.net

This is the portal where eligible entities can submit challenges on behalf of their communities.

Apply for a CostQuest license

Optional, but is very helpful for submitting bulk challenges

Individual Residents and Community Groups

Submit "leads" in the public portal

Individuals cannot submit challenges during this process themselves, but they can submit comments to via this portal that their local governments and eligible CAIs can use to find evidence of locations eligible for challenging.

Take the Indiana internet speed test

Any resident or business wishing to have their connectivity information submitted for a challenge will need to take the Indiana speed test over 3 days and send the downloaded results to their local government.

Entities submit bulk challenges via Ready.net if they have evidence of flawed fabric data.

Challenge Review

The Indiana Broadband Office will review submitted challenges to ensure there is enough strong evidence to support challenge claims.

Rebuttal Phase

Entities whose data has been challenged have a chance to refute those submissions.

Final Determination Phase

The Indiana Broadband Office will review submitted challenges to ensure there is enough strong evidence to support challenge claims.





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Obtaining a CostQuest License

CostQuest is the NTIA's partner in developing the fabric data licensing providers and other eligible entities use for mapping broadband serviceable locations.

What is Fabric Data?



Since it contains semi-sensitive information, only certain types of organizations are eligible to access the data.

What purpose will a CostQuest license serve for my organization?

Getting access to the fabric data can make it easier to match the location IDs of BSLs you intend to submit challenges for with what information you receive when you register in the Ready.net portal as an eligible challenger. It is a great tool to have for bulk challenges especially.

While a CostQuest license can be super helpful during the challenge process, it isn't mandatory. You can still submit challenges without this access.

SIRPC is here to help if you're an eligible entity intending to submit challenges on your community's behalf.



Obtaining a CostQuest License

Applying for CostQuest license for local governments and CAIs should be done as soon as possible. The waiting period for license approval could increase as other organizations across the country also apply for licensure.



You must already have an FCC Registration Number (FRN) <u>before</u> applying for a CostQuest license.

Requesting a Tier E License

The NTIA Tier E License supports participation in a challenge process organized under a Federal Broadband Granting Agency's (FBGA) broadband grant program(s). The Tier E license is intended for three types of organizations. Eligible organizations include (1) units of local government, (2) non-profits, or (3) other organizations that have signed an FCC Tier 4 license

Before you complete this form make sure you have the following information:

- Your organization's FCC Registration Number (FRN).
 - 1.1. You must have an ECC FRN and access to the email address provided, if you don't have an FRN, complete the steps described in 1.2. Getting an FCC Registration Number (FRN) in the Universal Licensing System
 - (ULS) | Federal Communications Commission
- 2 The company name as well as name, title and email address for the person who will administer the Tier D license on behalf of your organization. An Administrator adds counties, changes programs, and distributes the Data, etc.
- 3. A website (public URL) that describes your organization.

If you have already received a Tier E license and wish to expand your geographic entitlement (county list), please do not submit those requests through this website. There will be a distinct process announced for county modifications in the near future.

As part of the Tier E license request, our system will send you an email to verify the validity of your email address. This is a time-limited link. We recommend initiating the Tier E license request when you can complete the entire process. Our system also tabulates the number of requests from a single domain. We strongly recommend completing this request from your corporate domain rather than a shared domain like yahoo.com, mac.com, gmail.com, etc. To avoid e-mail messages getting trapped by spam filters, please white list </FAsupport@costquest.com>

Step 3: Submit a request to register

This form will ask you basic information about your organization.

After you have filled it out, you will get an email with a time sensitive link and more directions for next steps.

A series of questions asking for more details about your organization will follow. You will be asked:

- to confirm your organization's FRN
- what type of organization local gov or non-profit. Nonprofits will be expected to provide your FEIN from the IRS and other documents certifying your non-profit status
- name, title and contact information for person receiving& administering the fabric license data
- whether your organization is a Tier 4 BDC licensee. If you don't know, it's probably not.
- your organization's webpage link

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The last steps involve selecting which federal program you seek the Tier E license. For the purpose of the BEAD challenge, you should select NTIA. Then you will be asked to select the geographic areas relevant to your organization. Choose the county or counties your organization serves.



Local governments and community anchor institutions applying for Ready.net access will need to register.

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Community Engagement

Community engagement will be vital to helping your organization collect the necessary evidence for any challenges you intend to submit on behalf of your community. Below are some ideas for how to engage with your public for education and evidence collections:

- Sharing flyers about the challenge process and encouraging members of your community with poor connectivity to take the Indiana Speed Test
- Visiting community group meetings to educate people about what circumstances they should consider submitting evidence for a challenge and the proper way to collect it.
- Utilizing the reach of school districts to reach households or chambers of commerce to reach the business community and partnering with them to spread awareness.
- Sharing updates with your community across different forms of media about where you are in the process, and what progress has been made.

What to do with your results from the Indiana Internet Speed Test

• Download or screenshot your results

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- Upload your information directly to the portal on ConnectingIndiana.com
- These will be sent to any challenging entity registered in Ready.net as an organization serving your area.
- You also have the option to send your results directly to the challenging entity serving your area.
 - More than likely, this entity will be your local county government.
 - SIRPC is also registered as a challenger in order to assist the county governments in our region with submitting challenges. You can email your downloaded/ screen shot results to digitalinclusion.sirpc@gmail.com



YOU CAN DO MORE THAN JUST CONDUCT SPEED TESTS DURING THE CHALLENGE PROCESS!

Indiana also has a **Public Comment Portal** where individuals can submit comments or "leads" on locations they feel should be included in a challenge.

Just because individuals cannot submit challenges themselves does not mean they have to wait on an eligible entity to act. In fact, information community members give is vital to helping your government or CAI collect the strongest evidence for a challenge. This is an effort that requires cooperation from everyone!

How to submit comments to the public portal

Step 3: Select a Location

Search for the location you would like to comment on by typing your address into the search bar and then select the point on the map.

Note: If you don't see your address, select the point that you believe nearest to your rooftop.

Red or "unserved" locations will not be selectable on this map because they are already eligible for BEAD funding.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is Fabric Data?

Fabric data is the list of location IDs, addresses, coordinates and other related information for broadband serviceable locations.

Since it contains semi-sensitive information, only certain types of organizations are eligible to access the data.

What does "served", "unserved", and "underserved" mean?

"Served" means a location has access to internet meeting the federally designated minimum speed of at least 100mbps download and 20mbps upload.

"Unserved" refers to any location without access to internet which provides the federally required minimum speed of at least 25mbps download and 3mbps upload. This definition also applies to any areas where the only type of internet service available is satellite.

"Underserved" refers to any location without access to internet speeds of at least
100mbps download and 20 mbps upload.

Why do I need to take a speed test?

If you believe you frequently experience internet speeds slower than 100/20mbps or 25/3mpbs, you should check this by testing at ConnectingIndiana.com. This information is aggregated and saved by the Indiana Broadband Office to track connectivity data and help the State be aware of which areas need to be prioritized for broadband funding.

What is a VPN

A VPN means *virtual private network*. When one is activated, your data and online activity is shielded from third party trackers by connecting you to a private server before it connects to the server of the website you are visiting. You are given a temporary IP address, and your real, permanent IP address is hidden. This protects your online privacy and security, especially when you are connected to public wifi.

The IBO needs to be able collect location information of the address you are testing from
 so the mapping of connectivity data is accurate. Please make sure your VPN is turned off
 when you are conducting a speed test.



Frequently Asked Questions

Is a CostQuest license necessary to submit a challenge?

No, a CostQuest license is not necessary to submit a challenge. However, having a large dataset of location IDs can make it easier if your organization plans to submit bulk challenges on behalf of your community.

Is registering in Ready.net necessary to submit a challenge?

Yes. This is the portal the IBO created for the challenge process and all challengers must register in order to submit a challenge. Individuals cannot submit challenges themselves and due to the sensitive nature of some of the information required for challenge, only certain types of organizations are eligible to register. You must be a government or government agency, non-profit community anchor institution, or an internet service provider.

What if I need help with learning how to use the Ready.net portal?

The IBO has posted recordings of past webinars and challenge guides on their BEAD webpage with information on navigating Ready.net. They also will host "office hours" every Tuesday and Thursday throughout the entire challenge process.
